Our number one priority is safety and service to our citizens. We strive every day to ensure our community is one of the safest places to live.

We look forward to seeing you all at the various Fall activities this year. Please be safety conscious and remember our children will be out for Halloween.

A few things we can all do to ensure this year's Halloween turns out great are:

- Costumes should not obstruct breathing or vision, they should not impede mobility, and they should include some type of reflective component if worn at night.
- Drivers should pay extra close attention looking for trick-or-treaters who may dart into the roadway. Driving slower and covering the brake in town and residential neighborhoods is extremely appreciated.
- Children need to be escorted from house to house by a responsible adult.
- Parents should inspect all candy your trick-or-treater receives before it is consumed. Any candy that is not properly sealed or is loose, or looks to be tampered with in any way should be discarded.
